Often people who think about bringing a dog into their lives are thinking about a puppy. An adorable little cuddle bug that will steal their hearts and that they can train to be a long-time companion. Some people want to share their life with a dog but aren't up for all that goes with having a puppy (think no sleep, house training, your favorite things/furniture getting chewed up, etc.) so they adopt a young, but grown dog from a shelter or rescue. But what about older dogs? Those that have half or less of their already short lives left to live? Sadly, in regular shelters these dogs are often overlooked.

There is nothing sweeter than a senior Golden with their "sugar-face," soft eyes and oh-so-stinky breath! But even so, most of our adoption applicants are looking for dogs under 3 years old. We do get a fair number of older dogs throughout the year. At GRRR, we love our seniors. Just ask Ben, the office dog extraordinaire! Ben is 14 now. He came to us when he was 12. He is Francie's best buddy in the office during the day and if Mary needs a friend to go along on a car ride, count Ben in! He is so loved even though he can sometimes be a bit grumpy to younger, rambunctious pups. He definitely puts them in their place!

But of course, we can't keep all of the seniors permanently at Phoebe's Place – as much as we would like to. Luckily, special

people open their hearts and homes to senior dogs, taking them in and giving them a wonderful life for their remaining years or months. To all of our senior dog adopters, we are so thankful.

When it comes to senior dog loving, there is no one we know who compares to dedicated GRRR volunteers Barbara and Bob Crook. The Crooks are unique for GRRR in that, in 12 years, they have adopted over 45 dogs (some foster/hospice dogs), almost all seniors! I caught up with Barbara to gain a little insight into their lives with a constant handful of sugar-faces. I asked her to start at the beginning.

The Crooks had always had dogs and cats. They love animals but Barbara says they didn't really understand animal psychology too well – especially dogs. They had a Cocker Spaniel named Butch who they dearly loved. He lived to be 14 years old. It was so very hard to lose him that they decided no more dogs. Then they started watching Cesar Milan – Dog Whisperer and other dog shows. They learned so much about dog energy, living with dogs and being the leader of the pack. It made so much sense! So "no more dogs" turned into "we need to adopt a dog!" Barbara and Bob decided on Golden Retrievers with their sweetness and lovability. They thought they would go for an older dog because they weren't up for the high energy of a puppy or young dog. It was 2009.

They got in touch with GRRR and before too long they were coming out to meet a couple of dogs. Right off the bat, a 3-year-old male named Chester "picked" them. He knew it and they knew it! He said, "you are mine!" So, getting an older dog went by the wayside at that moment. Chester moved into their home and took over their hearts. He was Barbara's boy, a beautiful, deep red Golden. Their adventures with Goldens had begun. They decided, as many people do, that one Golden is not nearly enough, so back to GRRR they went and adopted Sadie, a senior girl, and before long, Nanna, another senior girl.

You Get the Dog You Need and the Dog That Needs You

Barbara says they quickly found that you get the dog you need and the dog that needs you. It just so happens that there have been a lot of dogs that the Crooks needed! They started fostering dogs and often would become "foster failures." Barbara and Bob decided to make a pact after a while: No one goes to GRRR, and if you do, do not come home with a dog!

I asked when it became clear that senior dogs were their thing. Barbara says senior dogs have a calm energy that fits their lifestyle. They both work from home so the dogs have them 24/7, which is good, especially if they have some special needs. Dogs can need a retirement home just like people! Senior dogs don't have anything more to prove, so the pack mostly gets along really well. They have the occasional dustup but not too often. They always bring the more dominant dogs to GRRR to meet "new recruits" for the retirement home on neutral ground. That, plus a ride home in the car together, and all is established about who's more in charge. It is mostly a very happy and relaxed bunch. The gang enjoys lots of naps, belly rubs, and following Barbara and Bob around.

The Crook's backyard backs up to a local park so the dogs can see people walking in the park, plus squirrels, raccoons, birds and other dogs. The pack has divided themselves into the front guard – the ones who charge the fence to make sure squirrels don't dare to enter the territory, the rear guard – who cheer on the front guard, and the officers – who stay on the porch and bark encouragement. The funniest is Daisy Mae who is blind. She gets around very well by smell and loves to join the front guard barking at the squirrels. She doesn't have a clue where the squirrel is exactly, but she gets very excited by the whole thing!

Life is never lonely at the retirement home – mostly quiet, but never lonely. There's always a herd following the Crook's wherever they go. Cooking lessons are one of the their pastimes, and they always have a very attentive and eager audience who would love to sample their new dishes!

Over the years, the Crooks have had mostly Goldens with a few other breeds mixed in. Max and Charlie Spinner were found together as strays. Charlie Spinner was a Golden with a brain tumor and Max was an older Border Collie. Max tried so hard to herd the dogs and get them to work together. It never worked, but Max tried! And who could forget Peyton – now Joey? When he was surrendered to GRRR, the owner told Mary he was an older Golden mix. When they arrived and he jumped out of the car, here was the funniest little terrier mix with a snaggle tooth and the biggest personality! Not a speck of Golden in him! He joined the pack at the Crooks and has been making them laugh ever since because he thinks he is the top dog!

So many beautiful and amazing Golden characters have spent their golden years with the Crooks. Casey, the ultimate Golden - a big, beautiful boy with a strong personality who claimed his space. Lily - the most beautiful and gentle girl of all time who was neglected and taken from a bad situation by authorities at age 10. Nellie who had a squinty smile that they knew was nothing but trouble. Bob went to GRRR with a friend and Nellie saw him and claimed him on the spot! Holly was an aging puppy mill momma who had no idea she was a dog. Living with a group of dogs who were fairly balanced helped Holly in ways they could not imagine. She would find a quiet space where she would just watch all of the happenings around her. It took her a very long time to take any food by hand. She never fully relaxed, but she did have a good friend in Dakota, and Barbara and Bob would smile when the two of them would run together. There was Lola who Barbara calls a force of nature because she had an impressive presence and was determined to do what she wanted to do. And Amber who incredibly went into heat at age 14! That just confused everyone, especially little Joey who thought he ought to be doing something about that!

Saying Goodbye

If you are like me, saying goodbye to a beloved friend is one of the hardest things in life. So, naturally I wondered, as most people who meet the Crooks do, how they can handle having to say goodbye so often. Barbara says that it is always unbelievably hard and that they always wish they could have known the dog longer. But they have come to know that they wouldn't trade the months of love and joy they have with each dog to avoid the sorrow at the end. Barbara says that the best thing they can do is give each dog a loving path because they give so much to us. She says it's amazing to watch the other dogs say goodbye and how well they understand what is happening. Each time it is sad but beautiful.

Barbara and Bob have had amazing things happen when a dog crosses the rainbow bridge that send chills. When their beloved Ben passed in the backyard, right after he took his last breath and they sat back, a butterfly flew into their circle and landed on his collar. With another dog, on a calm day, suddenly the wind chimes all began to sing as the dog crossed the rainbow bridge. Barbara and Bob will keep adopting seniors.

For the Crooks, having senior dogs is the best thing they have ever done, and for GRRR, we are eternally grateful and in awe of them and the pack! $\ref{eq:grade}$



Dear GRRR:


Carlos is an angel who came into our family a short two months ago...we are all so happy he did!






GRRR 2022 Calendar Photo Contest





Golden Angel: Tovi

Take a look at this little bundle of total cuteness. Her name is Tovi and she is now 5 months old. She was brought to GRRR and surrendered by a person who purchased her from a breeder in Texas with the goal of using her as a breeding female. She is a beautiful dog and will grow up to be stunning with her cream-colored silky fur. Surely the person who purchased her was thinking that they would see beautiful pups from her.

But alas, that was not to be, because you see, poor little Tovi is the victim of a genetic disorder called megaesophagus that is very difficult to treat and to manage. When her owner learned of this, they contacted the breeder who said they did not want the puppy back but that they would send her another puppy.

So Tovi came to GRRR at 9 weeks old. She is the cutest and sweetest little girl. She immediately stole Mary Kenton's heart and the hearts of everyone who saw her. She fit right in with the characters in the house. She is a normal, playful, clumsy adorable little girl who has one big problem.

You see, megaesophagus is a neurological condition where there is a lack of muscles in the esophagus. The muscles that are supposed to close the esophagus after the dog eats so food will stay down in their stomach to be digested. Dogs with this condition cannot keep anything – even water – down. Whatever goes down, comes right back up. There is no real cure and the only way to treat and manage this condition is for the dog to be upright for 10-15 minutes after they have eaten so the food will go into the stomach and stay there. Obviously, this requires significant time and dedication by a caring human. It's certainly not for everyone but GRRR took her in without batting an eye.

Tovi went to see Dr. Carpenter and had extensive and expensive diagnostic testing, such as ultrasound and x-rays, to examine her digestive system and to make sure she didn't have any other major medical problems. Dr. Carpenter placed her on a special diet of mild, runny/mushy food and antibiotics. Dogs with megaesophagus are very prone to pneumonia due to aspirating their food quite often.

Mary set about getting this sweet little girl into a good routine of eating and drinking water. Her water is drunk from a raised bowl. After she ate, Mary held her upright like a baby to make sure that food stayed down. Even though this is a huge commitment and requires dedication and patience, I think Mary secretly loved every minute of cuddling this little fur ball.

Tovi began to grow like a little weed and was really thriving. Megaesophagus is not something she will grow out of, so keeping her healthy and fed will always be a challenge.

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Tovi's extra lucky day (besides the one where she was brought to GRRR) was when a wonderful woman named Rose (a previous GRRR adopter) stepped up to say that she would love to love Tovi and would take on the challenge gladly! Rose took Tovi home a few weeks ago and renamed her Bella. Bella continues to grow and is becoming too big to hold upright after she eats now. There is a special chair called a 'Bailey Chair' that GRRR purchased for Rose. The Bailey Chair is like a highchair for dogs. Bella sits in the chair to eat and then stays there for 10-15 minutes.

We are happy to report that Bella and Rose are doing great together at the beginning of their special relationship. We are grateful to Rose for opening her heart and home to Bella. And we are so grateful to you, our donors, for giving to the Golden Angel Fund, which allows us to help so many deserving dogs who cannot help themselves.. •

Hayden is one of the most special Goldens we've ever rescued, but before he joined GRRR he had little to no hope of living the wonderful "Golden life" he so deserved. He just celebrated his first birthday shortly after joining us.

Sweet, frightened Hayden...how he melted our hearts when we first met our newest Golden Angel. He came to GRRR through a commercial breeder in Missouri who no longer needed him. Two of our wonderful volunteers – Steve Schmidt and Mark Springston – were more than happy to make the long trip to bring Hayden "home" to Colorado and into the loving care of GRRR.

breeding facility to their vehicle in a crate, and he literally stayed in the same position in the crate the entire 12-hour ride to GRRR. At every stop they made, Steve and Mark tried to get him to go potty, but he wouldn't move. He just stayed curled up and was very fearful. Steve and Mark worried that maybe he was unable to stand or walk at all. When they arrived at Phoebe's place, Hayden was carried in while still inside the crate which then had to be disassembled just to get him out. Finally, Hayden stood on his own, but when he moved, it seemed as if something wasn't quite right in his hind legs.

He also had one eye that was very cloudy.

When Steve and Mark first met Hayden, he was so scared he had to be carried from the

Hayden was reserved and cautious at first, but after a few days of rest and recuperation from his big adventure out into the world, he started to act more like a Golden. He even began playing like an overgrown puppy with some of the other dogs. Sometimes it seemed like he didn't really know how to control his body movements. He would sort of adorably "roll out" of his kennel for playtime. It has been so heartwarming to watch Hayden become such a lovable, happy, goofy Golden boy. He doesn't have an aggressive bone in his body and just loves everyone he meets – both people and dogs. We were so excited when he actually barked for the first time, and we could tell he was pretty proud and happy to hear his own voice too!

We can't help but pause and wonder what kind of a life Hayden had before joining GRRR. We doubt if he ever got to play outside on soft green grass, go for a walk, enjoy the company of other dogs or romp in a play area. When we first met him toys were a big mystery, and he was afraid of soft dog beds and blankets because he had never seen them before.

When Hayden first started getting out on walks at Phoebe's Place, we could tell by his unusual movements that without a doubt something was wrong with his hind end. Dr. Carpenter (Garrison Animal Care Clinic) gave Hayden a thorough examination that included X-rays of his hips and hind legs. Hayden was diagnosed with exterior luxating patella – a condition in which the patella, or kneecap, dislocates or moves out of its normal location. Dr. Bauer (Colorado Canine Orthopedics) performed surgery on Hayden on March 30th and Hayden is now recovering in a loving foster home with Laura and Steve Zlogar. They absolutely adore this large, goofy, fun-loving boy, and we know he is having the best time of his life being very loved and gently cared for. Laura and Steve have done an incredible job of keeping Hayden quiet, safe and happy during his recovery.

Dr. Hammond (Eye Clinic Veterinary) diagnosed Hayden's eye condition as persistent pupillary membranes which is a genetic condition (strands of pigmented tissue which attach to another surface of the iris, or lens or cornea of the eye). He will always be blind in one eye, but Hayden doesn't seem to be bothered by it at all. His primary "focus" is giving and receiving love! As long as someone is around to share his love with, our Hayden is a very happy boy. When you meet him, you will never notice that his kneecap isn't quite in the right place or that he's blind in one eye. What you will see is a big lovable puppy who enjoys every minute of every day now that he's a GRRR Golden.

Your donations to the Golden Angel Fund mean everything in the world to the precious Goldens who come into our care. It's hard to even imagine what would have happened to Hayden without all the love, support and medical attention he has received since joining GRRR. Hayden's new reality is that he will be adopted, adored, live a carefree life and be very loved. Even hikes in the beautiful Rocky Mountains are now on his to-do list. His enthusiasm and happiness is undeniable, and he brings a big smile to everyone who makes his acquaintance – all because of the incredible volunteers who have helped him and the kind and generous donors who have made his dreams come true. •

We picked up Yogi from GRRR just two days out of surgery. He was scarred, hurt, and really grungy. We worked Yogi through the rehab of the surgery, and after what I think was his first bath ever, Yogi came out 5 shades lighter, and he felt a ton better. Since then, he gets a shower about every couple of weeks.

Yogi stayed quiet for the first few weeks, then started to know and use his dog bed and play with his toys. Today he seeks out affection and readily gives it back. His personality is now really showing. Yogi has the run of the house and uses a dog door to go in and out to the back yard. He is still unsure of stairs, but we are working on that.

Yogi has more dog toys than any dog I have seen. He really likes the squeaker toys. He will carry them with him, and really likes to have them with him when he is sleeping. The squeaker toys are ok when we are awake, but Yogi thinks they are really fun early in the morning when everyone else is sleeping.



We take Yogi to our office every day. The presence of a good dog just takes the edge off of the day. Clients who are accustomed to seeing him know and ask about Yogi's recovery. We have a client who was in a motorcycle accident with a truck. He met Yogi and the two of them bonded right away from the fact that they both had a pretty good case of road rash. It is truly amazing when you see the human / animal bond.

Our goal with Yogi is to train him for the AKC Canine Good Citizen and move our way up to AKC Therapy Dog. In only 3 short months Yogi is a different dog. He is well adjusted, seeks out affection and is respectful of his home. He adds so much to our lives and the others that he touches.

Jenny, Yogi and I want to say thank you to the volunteers of GRRR for making the long drive to New Mexico and taking him back and forth to Colorado Canine Orthopedics. We appreciate all the work from Colorado Canine Orthopedics for Yogi's medical care, and especially the benefactors to the Golden Angel Fund for Yogi's care.

Kaiya by Mary Kenton

A cystoscopy revealed that Kaiya had ectopic ureter, a low functioning kidney and a bladder that sat low in the pelvis, in addition to a hooded vulva that adds to the constant UTI infections.

Kai's surgeon, Dr. Turner at CSU, did an amazing job communicating with us regarding the options, potential complications and recovery process. The best procedure for Kaiya was removal of her kidney and ureter and tacking up her bladder, and repair the hooded vulva. Kaiya did well in surgery. Steve Schmidt volunteered to be her chauffeur for trips back and forth to CSU. Steve, like all of us here at GRRR, have fallen in love with this sweet girl.



Kaiya's incontinence has really decreased. She is still on medication for incontinence and time will tell if she will need the continued support of medication. But her reoccurring urinary tract infections should be over. Kaiya recovered quietly for two weeks in our Robert Sturm Veterinary Medical Room, which has been a godsend for so many of our Goldens during recovery and illness.

Kai and GRRR are very grateful to all the supporters of the Golden Angel Fund that helps changev the lives of so many dogs who would never have had the opportunity to live a life without pain and suffering. Kai is slowly getting back to playing with her friends while awaiting a wonderful adoptive home where she will be loved and live a Golden Life!

As most of you know, our dog intake numbers in 2020 were about 100 dogs less than what we generally see. Owner surrenders were down, we had one less Turkey dog rescue, and we were unable to get as many former breeding dogs as we did in 2019 due to COVID. However, intake




numbers seem to be steadily increasing this year. We have seen an increase in owner surrenders so far in 2021. The unfortunate part of this is that most of the surrenders have been younger Goldens with severe health issues. We have seen everything from heart murmurs to tremors to megaesophagus and many things in between. Fortunately for these pups, they have landed at GRRR and are receiving the best care possible to treat and/or manage their respective conditions.

I've been asked by many people why we're seeing so many "special needs" dogs coming into our care. My best guess is that some breeders are just trying to make a quick buck by breeding dogs that they know are not genetically sound. This isn't exactly a new problem because unethical breeders have been doing this for years, but I can't help but wonder if more breeders are possibly turning a blind eye to some of these genetic issues and just hoping that the traits won't get passed on to the puppies. Golden Retrievers have always been in high demand, but since COVID they have been in higher demand than usual. Breeders are now charging well over \$2,500 for Golden Retriever puppies, without any sort of health guarantees. Gone are the days of finding a puppy for less than \$1,000. The takeaway from this is that if you choose to buy a dog from a breeder, please be sure to research the breeder: Visit their place, see the living conditions, make sure you interact with the mother and father of the puppy you're purchasing. It's also important to ask for health guarantees and what sort of vet checks and testing they do on their pups. Yes, you will definitely pay a higher price for your puppy, but it will save you money in the long run – as well as a lot of heartache. \bullet

People were always baffled when I told them that our sweet dog Zadie was a "Turkey dog" rescued from the streets of Istanbul. I would hear, "You mean the country Turkey?" And I would reply, "Yes, she is now bilingual, and she is so smart and sweet!" Zadie had only been in the U.S. for 72 hours when we met her on November 22, 2018. She was 10 years old. And, as we learned over the past 2 years and 2 months, she was filled with love and the sweetest girl, and a "comeback kid" kinda gal.

When we went to GRRR to meet two senior dogs who just arrived on the Turkey dog flight, Zadie instantly connected with Dan as she rolled over for a tummy rub. 


In Memory ••


Sadie Mae by Dave & Linda Mullins
