Who rescued whom? Here's a story that may help answer the question.

Meet Ellie, the English Cream Golden who came to GRRR from Romania, via South Dakota, and then to our home. She was barely over a year old but her personality was already shining through. Those dark eyes showed a sweet and gentle soul.

Yet the spunkiness was also apparent. I thought Ellie would be a good fit for the Littleton Adventist Hospital dog therapy team. My previous Golden, Suzeigh, was also a therapy dog, and I knew Ellie had the right personality...and spunk...for the job.

Ellie is quite an inspiration to all she meets, beginning with the Welcome Desk and right down to the Gift Shop. She greets everyone in the lobby, making sure no one is missed. And so the day starts; she just loves getting petted. I am constantly amazed at the connections that the doctors, nurses, patients and visitors make with her. It must be those eyes, long eyelashes and creamy colored coat that is so inviting. Many just love to snuggle with her. So many of the staff know her by name and are so happy to have her visit.

Making the Rounds

A typical visit involves seeing patients in areas like Infusion, Chemotherapy, and the ICU. We also visit various patient floors as well as individual patients who have requested a dog visit. Once, Ellie was visiting a family waiting in the surgery area and the kids were loving on her. When they were called to go speak



to the doctors, I looked around and there was Ellie, going right in with them, bringing up the rear! A good laugh was had by all.

Ellie has a very calming effect. One volunteer who works in Outpatient Registration always introduces Ellie to all the patients who are signing in, and she tells them how much she loves this dog. They all duck their heads in to see her and smile.

One time a nurse paged a doctor in the OR to see Ellie, as the nurse knew how much he missed seeing all the dogs during COVID. He finished his surgery and met Ellie as he stepped out of the elevator.

Peoples' faces light up when they see Ellie coming down the hall. She checks out the nurses' stations to see if they might have a biscuit or two. Usually Ellie wins out. The nurses always say how much these visits make their day and how much they appreciate the dogs and volunteers. Nurses and patients show me cell phone pictures and tell stories of their own dogs. It really is heartwarming. So much happens with each visit, it's hard to focus on just one or two patients.

The Dog Will See You Now

"Pat and Ellie bring so much joy and energy not only to the patients," said the Nurse Manager in ICU, "but also to the staff! Working in the ICU, I see how much stress the nurses and staff experience. When Ellie, with her mellow and sweet temperament, comes visiting, everyone brightens! Ellie is really in her element! I also see how much patients' and families' stress decreases while they pet her, which is such a blessing during a very stressful time in their lives."

Ellie and I also visit waiting rooms. Suddenly the room is pretty much filled with smiles. Ellie does have her favorite departments, though, where she knows exactly where the treats are. One is Medical Records, where she is treated like a princess with treats and a massage. Ellie has come to count on these massages at the end of her shift. You cannot trick her to leave the hospital before this, and she will plant those paws and not move. The girls in Medical Records just love her. She really does know the perks of this job.

Recent Rescues

Dear GRRR:

Bojo (previously Joe) came to GRRR as a puppy with serious sub-aortic stenosis and a leaking aortic valve. His prognosis was not good, and the vets said he'd be lucky to make it to his first birthday. They said that one day he'd be running and would probably have a fatal heart attack. Mary Kenton asked me if I'd be a hospice mom to Bojo. I wasn't sure at first if I'd be strong enough to handle losing such a young dog. I sat in the kennel with Bojo and looked into his beautiful brown eyes and knew I had to take him. I asked the vets for advice, and they said "let him be a dog and have fun."



Two years later we moved to the north coast of Northern Ireland. It was quite a traumatic time. I was so worried about Bojo flying, and there was so much work to do: getting paperwork ready, making sure all shots were up to date and booking flights to bring two dogs into the UK. We stumbled over so many hurdles along the way and would never have been ready without the help of Mary and my vets. The journey itself was an event as the dogs had to be at DIA 4 hours before the flight, the flight itself was 9 hours direct to London, and then the dogs had to stay overnight at the Heathrow animal center to be checked over. The next day they were put on another flight to Belfast where I picked them up. I was so worried about Bojo with his heart condition but I knew that Dundee, my other dog, would be a calming influence on him. Needless to say, they arrived looking fine and extremely excited to see me. After all the stress and worrying about them, I think they weathered the journey better than I did!

Both Dundee and Bojo settled quickly into to their new home with a fenced backyard and lots of green grass to run on. They especially loved the nearby beach, which is long (1.6 miles) and sandy. Every morning I would take them for a walk along the beach come rain or shine. Dogs are allowed off leash so I let Dundee off immediately. One day I decided to chance letting Bojo off. He took off through the waves chasing and barking at a seagull. Suddenly he staggered and went down in the water. He couldn't get up so when I reached him I just held his head out of the water. He was too heavy for me to lift, and there was no one on the beach to help. Eventually he staggered to his feet and very slowly we headed back to the car. I took him to my vet and she said no more running as the next time could be fatal.

Last February we lost Dundee to a very aggressive cancer that had returned and Bojo started to fret. He and Dundee had done everything together, and it was a huge loss for all of us. For weeks Bojo kept stopping on walks and looking back as if to say "Where is Dundee?" I started spending more time with Bojo, and we started going for longer walks every day and exploring new places where Dundee had not been. I think this, and time, have helped him.

We have since taken Bojo on a ferry to England for two weeks and two short ferries to the Irish republic. He loves going to new places and gets very excited. He loves meeting new people and is very friendly with every dog he sees. I often get asked what breed he is as the Golden Retrievers here are all big English creams. People think Bojo is a Golden Irish (Golden Retriever cross Irish Setter). I've seen a couple of these here and they do look like Bojo.

This month Bojo had his 4th birthday and is still looking great. He has lots of energy so the long beach walk must help. He has become accustomed to always being on a leash, but he still gets to greet other dogs on our walks. I believe the cooler weather here helps him too as his heart had to work harder in the heat. I call Bojo my miracle dog as I never expected to still have him four years on. Each new day is special. I think back to that day when Mary asked if I'd take him and wondered why I hesitated at all to say yes, even if it was only for a second.




Good Morning GRRR:

Waffles came all the way from Turkey (formerly named Saison) to fill my life with joy and happiness. When I took Waffles home, he had trouble getting in the car, since I believe he had never been in a car before! When we got home, he was so startled (and scared) looking at the parking lot and at home inside. He couldn't believe he had so much space!

Golden Angels: Breeder Girls

Our Golden Angel stories are almost always about an individual pup and their medical issues. This summer, during one of our rescues of breeding dogs from a puppy mill, GRRR was able to rescue nine beautiful Goldens. Three of them were females around the age of three. We are now calling them "the shy girls" because they have some of the worst puppy PTSD that we



have seen. We want to tell you their collective story this quarter because it is compelling and heart wrenching but also because they deserve to have their story told. More important, they deserve to recover from their trauma – both physical and mental – and live the rest of their lives being loved, not mistreated, by people. We are grateful that, because of our generous donors, the Golden Angel Fund, and our volunteers, we can provide the care they need during their rehabilitation.

Meet April, Addie and Tess – the shy girls. They are medium-sized Goldens. Tess is a red Golden and Addie and April are a beautiful cream-color with dark brown eyes. They were all owned and released by the same breeder. We don't know very much about this specific breeder, but we can tell by how the dogs act that their lives were not very pleasant. We know the breeder has a very large number of dogs. He is producing all sorts of designer dogs and we have heard that he performs artificial insemination himself. Recently we learned that he has been brought up on charges by the USDA of over 100 violations of the Animal Welfare Act because of his poor treatment of his dogs. He is currently appearing in court on these charges.


We heard a shocking story from another rescue. This is the worst of the worst. No dog should ever be treated the way these dogs have. The other rescue obtained a pregnant female on the same day that we got the shy girls. When they got her to their vet, they saw that she had a severe case of pyometra (infection of the reproductive tract). On closer examination, it was discovered that the poor girl had been artificially inseminated, and her uterus had been sewn with fishing line. It is disgusting.

All three of our sweet, shy girls were totally terrified of people when they arrived at Phoebe's Place in late August. We could tell they were kept in very small enclosures because when they were in our larger runs or in the play yard, they would just go around in circles as if they didn't know what to do with a little freedom. They would not let anyone approach them for the first several days. April's whole body just shook when we approached her. Both she and Addie looked so afraid, as if we were going to kick them. It breaks our heart and frankly really makes us mad to see these beautiful dogs in that state. Poor little Tess had a severe skin condition where large patches of her back and sides were bare, leathery skin. We didn't know quite what to make of it until she could see Dr. Carpenter.

April had very recently had pups and her teats were very enlarged. One of April's teats had a mass on it that would require removal and testing. We thought little Addie might be pregnant again. She had some bleeding and may have aborted her small litter. When Dr. Carpenter spayed the girls, he did see that each already had an incision. So we suspect that the breeder had done the insemination surgery on them too. Unbelievable.

Walking on a leash was a big "no-go" for all three girls. Little by little, we have gotten Addie to walk slowly with us. The other two will follow behind but when a leash is put on them, they stop in their tracks.

Every day, our volunteers patiently sit, stroke, and talk to the girls. With leashes on, we coax them and, eventually, they will learn that the leash is an invitation to fun and adventure. Tess's fur has begun to grow back in, so her condition was likely caused by stress and nutritional deficiencies. When we go into the kennel now, little April still shakes like crazy but her little tail now wags down between her legs. She is learning to look forward to human interaction and not fear it so much. Little Addie is our rock star leash walker and will hopefully teach the other girls. This is going to take time, patience and a lot of love.



We are so glad that we were able to rescue these girls and get them out of those horrible conditions. We will take the time they need to help them to recover so they can go to wonderful forever homes. Please donate to the Golden Angel Fund so we can continue to pay for medical expenses for all the dogs in our care. •

Golden Angel: Maya

Hi everyone. My name is Maya. Some of you may know me as Willow. That was my name when I came to GRRR. But Mary Kenton thought my name should not sound like "no" since I'm a very positive puppy. So now, I'm Maya. It's good that I'm the optimistic type, because I had a very rough start to my life.

I was born last December with a medical condition that I can't pronounce (Maya had an ectopic ureter, a birth defect in which the tubes from the kidneys to the bladder are not attached at the correct location in the bladder, resulting in constant dribbling and urinary incontinence.) Even though I'm a very smart girl and learned how to do my business outside, I was still having problems all the time. I couldn't help it and I could tell that people didn't like it. It was hard for me and everyone else to understand what was wrong. I am not a bad puppy. I am sweet and happy and want to be a good girl.

Finally, my family took me to their vet who figured out what was wrong and said that surgery could fix my condition. Wow, what a relief! I could be fixed so that I could have a normal life and not mess up the house all the time. Unfortunately, the cost of the surgery was just too much for my first family. They were very sad, but they loved me so much that they wanted me to have the chance of a better life. They made the very hard decision to do what was best for me and find someone who could take care of me. That's where GRRR stepped in to help. The good people at GRRR said they would cover the costs of my surgery and take care of me afterwards. How did I get so lucky?

The next thing you know, I was at the Colorado State University Veterinary Hospital. I had an operation to fix my "plumbing," and received the very best care there. Then it was back to Phoebe's Place to recuperate and look for the best forever home for me. Mary and all the volunteers who help out at GRRR took good care of me. I

I like to lie upside down, slide down steps with my legs behind me and steal shoes to take out in the yard. I have learned a lot from my brother, Kodi, such as how to wait until the screen door opens before trying to run out the door, listening for the UPS driver who brings treats, and how to run inside at the speed of light when he starts howling at coyotes. I have already developed a fan club of kids in the neighborhood who knock on the door just to pet my sweet face.

Some of my favorite activities include riding in the car, going on new trails and dipping my belly in the lake – especially when my mom doesn't want me to get wet. I have comfy beds all over the house but still feel most comfortable on the hard floor. I am still not sure what to do with toys or balls. I don't ever bark but my parents enjoy hearing me grumble and stretch early in the morning to get the day started.

I am becoming a more confident boy and enjoying every new adventure. It feels really good to be loved and valued. I thank GRRR for giving me this happy life.

Brewster

Brewster, aka "Brewster-Dog," "Brewster Dog-bone," "Son," and various other names connoting playful affection, departed this life on September 21. He was 13 or 14 years old and had been one of GRRR's Golden Angels. And "angel" he was.

Before being rescued and adopted, Brewster (his original name) had survived a house fire early in 2016. His elderly owner lost her life, and her adult children were unable to provide him a permanent home, so they brought this wonderful dog to GRRR.



At some point before being rescued, Brewster had endured a femoral head osteotomy and a permanently dislocated hip, but so much tissue had grown around that hip that correcting the dislocation wasn't feasible. Dr. Michael Bauer of Colorado Canine Orthopedics performed an ACL repair, which helped improve Brewster's strength in that leg to compensate for the loss of strength in the hip. The Golden Angel fund provided for the treatment.

Although it's hard to believe at this point, Brewster was initially a finicky eater, owing perhaps to his previous life relying on table scraps. Fortunately, his finicky days were numbered, as his daily happy dance at mealtimes demonstrated. And when we say "happy dance," we're not exaggerating. Even as a "Golden Oldie," Brewster jumped around, sometimes with all four paws off the floor, while exclaiming "woof!" It was a joy to witness his enthusiasm.

One thing he wasn't happy about was wind. On very windy days or during thunderstorms, Brewster would seek shelter in a closet. On more than one occasion, we found him hiding in a bathtub (empty, of course). But in recent months he seemed calmer.

Brewster endeared himself to all who met him—really, how can you not love a Golden?—and had a comical habit of attempting to walk through the legs of visitors (and us), from the front or the back. Even at his age, he tolerated the occasionally playful antics of his adoptive sister, a Pyrenees / Anatolian Shepherd mix who joined us in 2019.

Brewster also endeared himself to complete strangers when he volunteered to join GRRR at a fundraising event at the Capitol in 2017 for Colorado Gives Day, sporting a vest to collect contributions from people who stopped to pet him. We called this "pimping." But hey, he collected some serious bucks!

He followed us everywhere—Mary especially, when he'd follow her down to the basement to listen in on her Zoom watercolor class and sniff around the books and art supplies. And when she worked out on the elliptical exercise machine, he'd hunker down nearby until it was time to return to the main floor. Brewster also joined us on the sofa to "watch" TV. When it was time to go to bed, he'd follow us into the bedroom and sleep on his dog bed.

His hearing was amazing, too: No matter where he was in the house, when the metal lid to the jar of dog treats was lifted, he was there. And when we got ice out of the ice maker, he was there, obviously feeling entitled to a frozen refreshment.

Then, one morning in September, Brewster remained in the bedroom while we began our morning routine. Suspecting

something wasn't quite right, we checked on him. He wouldn't move, except to briefly lift his head, then dropping it. His breathing was labored, and when offered a few bits of kibble, he lay there, not responding. Fortunately, Parker Animal Hospital was able to see him right away, so we gently rolled him onto a towel—he couldn't move—slid him down the hall and managed to place him into our car.

We don't know exactly what caused his precipitous decline during the night, but our vet, Dr. Julie Hayes, suspected it was his heart and, mercifully, euthanized him. The staff shared tears and hugs.

We are grateful to those who rescued Brewster, to the Golden Angel fund for helping with his surgery, and to Brewster himself, who gave us five years of happiness. •


