A Golden Retriever's Way to Riches

As a volunteer writing animal welfare grants for GRRR, I became puppy mill literate. As some adopters know, GRRR has a program to rehabilitate breeder dogs rescued from mills and unethical breeders. There was my opportunity to get some first-hand, up-close experience with arriving rescues.

Some mill dogs clearly show signs of trauma, or what I call a "mill mind." Very scared Goldens come to GRRR and receive kindness, socialization, and care from our 24-hour caregiver, as well as top-of-the-line medical attention. I learned the whole truth about the hardships they faced in mills and backyards while writing those grants. This 1.1 billion dollar (conservatively speaking) commercial industry has a long history and is still thriving. How could I educate other dog lovers? I find that way too many folks out there believe that laws have been passed so that mills no longer exist. Not so. The mill "brokers" are slick and have found ways to sell dogs through the internet to unsuspecting puppy-desperate consumers.

Along Came Cady

Then along came my new adoption, Cady. Obese (98 pounds), full of parasites and worms with bare skin showing through her shaved coat, but sweet with eyes that shined like polished gems. I could see she would be mine. Cady spent seven years as a breeder dog for an out-of-state unethical breeder. She followed me home as a foster the day of her arrival at Phoebe's Place. Once home, some of her fears began to surface and we started the socialization process. With lots of help and support from staff and GRRR members, Cady's fears began to subside. Six months and 28 dropped pounds later, she was a gorgeous Golden, inside and out.

Fears don't subside overnight for a Golden who has experienced trauma. It's an incremental process. Just like most of the world, some days Cady is in the shadows and some days she's in the sunlight. But the wins overcoming her fears continue to be seen. She's made gains with becoming a "brave heart" with a home and true companion. That's a golden fortune for a neglected dog who only knew a world of puppy production for seven years. She's in her glory now with trips to Stanley Lake, and she loves to hang out with me, always keeping me in her line of sight.




...And a Goose Chase

While visiting my friend's lake house, Cady was introduced to some wildlife. A flock of geese landed on the shoreline and she took off towards them. She ambushed one, caught it and shook it by its lanky neck before throwing it on the ground. Are we in big trouble? Did she kill it? We ran into the house for help and returned to the scene 2 minutes later. The goose was gone. Must have played dead to survive. But, as far as Cady could tell, she got a goose.

A Book About the Plight of Puppy Mill Dogs

I like to paint Goldens. Cady became my painting "assistant" and live model during the pandemic. Within a year, 24 paintings accumulated. An idea sparked: Why not put them into a book to let other dog lovers know of the plight of puppy mill breeder dogs? I find that most folks out there, even dog lovers, do not know that this commercial industry is thriving. So, I followed that spark and along came A Fortune of Gold book.

The book is a fictional dog drama told from the mill mama dog's perspective with a happy ending. The story is based on some of Cady's beginnings and rescue. The mama dog in the story, named #888 (in reality, mill dogs do not have names, just numbers) wants only to have a dog's life, but she's caged, overbred, and does not see the possibility of a Golden's life. When her production numbers drop and she is no longer profitable to this manufacturing industry, the dog is discarded to an auction or shelter.



The outside world is an unknown territory for a mill dog who only knows the cruel mill world. Without a "brave heart," fears show up. It's not the end of the story by any means. The dog gains insight and sees possibility.

My intention of the book was to create a colorful way to educate other dog lovers and let them know that change with this dilemma is possible. Just like it is possible for a former mill breeder dog's hardships to turn into gold. And like quieting the fears from a mill dog's past traumas, change with this industry appears to be incremental. The good news is that there are reduction strategies in place that are helping. GRRR's program to rescue breeder mill dogs is one of them. Those of us who volunteer and contribute to the welfare of these dogs are participating in this strategy.

It feels like this story is just at the start line. As the dog in the story says, "there's no finish line in sight, so I'll keep on track with a brave heart..." on each step that she accomplishes to get to the top of the staircase to her brave heart.

May they all find a world sweet, soft and Golden. $\ensuremath{\mathfrak{O}}$

Golden Angel: Bodie

Hi everyone in GRRR-land! My name is Bodie. I am a handsome black Goldendoodle boy. My Dad was a black Poodle and my Mom was a Golden Retriever. I am 14 whole months old now and I am still just a big puppy. I love to run and play and bark and snuggle. I love other dogs. I am interested in EVERYTHING and just want to have fun all the time! When I was just a teeny pup at 8 weeks old, I was adopted by a wonderful couple who wanted a big goofball like me to love.

They took me home to their big house with the best backyard. My life was great, and I was growing up fast and learning all kinds of new things. My Mom worked really hard at getting me started on my training. I can 'sit', 'stay' and 'wait' before I go out the door on a walk. I am good at waiting to go outside to do my business and I am pretty good on a leash too! When I was 6 months old, my parents noticed me limping a little sometimes, so they took me to a special vet to check out my legs. The vet said that my elbows had something called osteochondrosis. That's just a big goobledy-gook word to me, but it means that the cartilage in my elbow joints did not completely convert to bone as I grew. It can form a flap or even some fragments that hurt a lot when I play too hard. The vet said I should rest and come back to get checked in a few months.

I was getting older but sadly, so were my owners, and one day they decided that they had to move to a place where they could stay as they got even older. Somewhere not so big and hard to take care of. That sounded great to me. When we got there, we found out that it really wasn't a good place for a big dog like me who loves to run and play. There was nowhere for me to run, and it didn't seem like the other people there really liked me. I think I kind of scared them.

My owners decided that I needed a better home where I could grow up playing and being a happy boy, so they brought me to Mary Kenton at GRRR. I was pretty excited to be there because there are lots of dogs living right here! And there are wonderful fenced-in play yards that I get to go in with the volunteers who come to play with us all each day. Mary thought that I should get some more training and individual attention, so she arranged for me to go to a foster home where there was another dog, a Labrador retriever, being trained to become a service dog. I really liked it there because I had another big dog to play rough with all the time. I did notice that my legs were pretty sore every night when I went to sleep. My foster Mom and Mary decided that I should come back to GRRR where I can play some but also rest a bit more.

The special vets that work with us GRRR dogs think that I probably need to have surgery on my legs to relieve pain and get that rough cartilage smoothed out. Then I will be able to run and play all I want! I may be able to have both legs done at once or I might have to do one at a time. I know the doctors will figure out the best things to help me get better. They have already told me that I will have to be very patient for several weeks after I have surgery so that I can heal up and get stronger before I resume being my usual rambunctious self. I am up for it although I can't say I really look forward to that part!

Mary says that it would be best for me to already be in my forever home when I have surgery. If I had a person or a family who would be willing to help me through this short period of time while I get my legs up to snuff, I promise I will be the best boy for them. I will make them smile each day and do my very best to be a good boy. I want to learn more things and Mary says that I am not only handsome and sweet but also very smart! Check me out! President's Report

We are grateful to have brought over and rehomed about 175 "Turkey Dogs" from Turkey so far. As we approach one year since the CDC banned the import of dogs into the U.S., we can reflect on how much we miss seeing those incredible pups come bounding out of their crates at DIA. Most were happy and healthy, although some of the Turkey dogs required medical or behavioral treatment. Once cleaned up, they were easily placed in new forever homes.

But at the same time, we know that we've been able to do so much good rescuing former breeder dogs from mills and hoarding situations. Dogs with these backgrounds often take much longer to lose their fear, be socialized, and become ready to get on with life. As you've read in earlier newsletters, they haven't lived like normal dogs. They lived in crates, except when being bred, and know little about grass, toys, or human affection.



But that's where GRRR excels. We are one of only a few Golden Retriever rescues nationwide with a facility. Phoebe's Place enables us to keep dogs as long as they need our care, and be sure they are only adopted when they are ready. Our volunteers and staff work with them at their pace and level of need – removing fear cannot be rushed for human convenience. That's not to say that other rescues don't do their very best, but a foster-based system limits which dogs they can take in based on which homes are available at the time.

Our mission entails "never saying no to a Golden in need," and we will adjust our strategies as situations require. We learned about flexibility during the pandemic, and our ongoing strategic planning helps us determine how to pivot quickly to do the most good. I'm proud of GRRR and all the work we've done to rescue so many dogs through the years.


