
Puppy-Palooza!

She gave birth on December 4 to nine adorable puppies (one was stillborn). Ella was a good mama and all her pups were adopted as soon as they were 8 weeks old. Ella was adopted to a great home too.



Coco, by Mark and Shari Nomady



Volunteer Spotlight?

My bride Stacy and I started our volunteering journey with GRRR about 17 years ago. Like so many other GRRR volunteers, Stacy started as a VIP dog walker and I soon followed. Walking dogs is a great way to meet these amazing creatures and, in a small way, make a connection with them and, hopefully, brighten their day a bit. They certainly brighten ours.

I have also been a transporter for several years now, mainly for GRRR, but also for Paws for Colorado. I have found transporting to be an especially rewarding experience. Transports can vary from picking up one dog from an owner release in the metro area, to 20 dogs from a puppy mill breeder in Missouri. In all cases, one of the benefits of being a transporter is the wonderful feeling you get knowing that you are helping to get these wonderful souls to their new lives.



We might be picking up an older dog that is in tough shape, nearing the end of life. But knowing that their last few days or months will likely be so much better, thanks to the care they will get from Mary and the good people at GRRR, is reassuring. In my experience, the interaction with the dogs, even though sometimes challenging, is always rewarding, and most times fun. The interactions with the humans on the pick-up side of the transports can be pretty interesting, to say the least. We might meet a heartbroken owner who, for a valid reason, cannot keep their dog. As a guy, tearful emotional hand offs are way out of my comfort zone. We need to be respectful and sympathetic to the hard, gut-wrenching decision the owner has made to do what is right for their dog, but also want the handoff as unemotional for the dog as possible. I have found that, after maybe a quick hug, staring at my feet can be quite effective as I moonwalk the dog(s) to the van.

Mill dog rescues are a whole different kettle of fish (dogs). Picking up dogs at Southwest Auctions Service in Wheaton, Missouri, is a two-day affair. Day one is drive to Joplin Missouri where we spend the night. Day two starts early with the 46-mile drive to Wheaton. Auctions are normally held on Saturdays and we pick up our dogs on Sunday or Monday. The day we leave all depends on the likelihood that we will be successful in acquiring dogs. Dogs brought to the auctions are commonly older dogs that are viewed by their owners as no longer suitable for breeding. The ideal situation, from our standpoint, is a breeder who is getting out of the business and therefore disposing of their inventory. To save these dogs from being sold to another breeder, or worse, rescues like GRRR do our best to acquire the dogs and get them out of the puppy mill cycle.

The pickup itself is generally the most stressful part of the trip, for the dogs and the transporter. It is generally a loud, chaotic experience. The dogs are understandably scared and reluctant to get picked up (literally) by a total stranger to go who knows where. Once they are all loaded in their crates, we hit the road for the long trip back to Phoebe's Place. Some of the first words that I say to my four-legged passengers are "this may feel like one of the worst days of your life but actually this will be one of the best days of your life, getting the hell out of here." The dogs generally settle in pretty quickly once we hit the road. The first part of the drive can be pretty loud but they tend to quiet down after a few minutes. As dog owners and dog lovers, we know that dogs can be great listeners. The rescue dogs are no exception. They seem to absorb the pearls of wisdom that we share with them on the drive, such as observations about the driving abilities of other drivers, or the less-than-flattering comments about the typical crosswinds in Kansas. I am pretty sure the dogs also really enjoy my singing. I know you are probably thinking "haven't these dogs suffered enough?" We typically make at least three stops on the way home to check on the dogs, clean up crates as needed, and gas up the van.

Picking up dogs from a breeder for the first time is always an adventure – especially from Amish breeders. Even with GPS, it is easy to get lost. And, since the Amish typically do not have phones, locating them can be a challenge. As guys, we are not big on asking for directions, but one does what one has to do.

Some mill dog breeders are better than others. As the person picking up the dogs, we have to bite our tongue at times and be respectful. We do not want to say something that will shut down the pipeline to rescuing these dogs from that environment.

I am so proud of GRRR. Such a wonderful collection of caring people. From top to bottom, salt-of-the-earth people caring for these precious creatures. It is truly a privilege to be part of this noble mission. \checkmark



Hello GRRR:

We adopted Skylee on November 20th, 2022 shortly after we lost our 11-year-old Belgian shepherd girl, Lilly, to lung cancer. Our German shepherd, Riley, became very depressed and having been through this before, we knew that we needed to him find a companion. Skylee's post stated that she was special needs. Since we have experience with special needs, feline and canine, my sister and I submitted an adoption application.

We were very excited to bring Skylee home and provide a companion for Riley. We soon realized that Skylee required a lot of love, care, patience and time to heal and understand what her new life was going to be like. We established a consistent schedule for her; normal feeding time, walks twice daily, playtime in the backyard, playtime in the house, and playing with her babies (yes she has new toys along with her original toy she brought from the rescue; we call him Jack). It was important for both Skylee and Riley that we establish a routine.

Skylee realized she had a yard to run and chase squirrels and rabbits, and run with Riley. She had to overcome several challenges and we are here to help her. She is settling in and feeling the comforts of a loving home, including many warm beds, blankets, warmth, socialization, training, yard playtime, and meeting pet pals in the neighborhood.



Skylee is doing well, and we know that it will take more time to work through any triggers or anxiety, but we feel she is a great fit. Riley loves her and he's starting to really engage with her a lot more. We love watching the transition. Riley has only been with our family for 1.5 years and he had a lot of things to work out when he first came too. Lilly was a great teacher for Riley as she was very quiet and calm. And now Riley is a great teacher for Skylee.

Skylee is getting the care that she needs as a diabetic, and she has already had vet visits as well as therapy including acupressure, acupuncture and massage, which will help even more in her healing process. We are monitoring her to make sure she has what she needs to live a healthy and fulfilling life. Skylee is very sweet. She is still learning to live in a pack, but she is coming along. This Quarter's Golden Angel is cute little Bailey Lou. This adorable girl is just 2 years old. She came to GRRR from New Mexico when her owners decided that they couldn't care for her anymore. The little sweetie has not one, but two bad hips! This condition causes significant pain for the dog. Poor little girl has been dealing with it her whole life so far. She was put on medication to help with the pain, but the dosage was not high enough. How hard for a young pup who just wants to play to have that constant pain.

We gladly took her into our care knowing that we have fantastic veterinarians to support us. We have talked about Colorado Canine Orthopedics many times in this column because they have helped so many of our dogs through surgery for knees, hips, spines, elbows and more.

While we wait for an available doctor to perform Bailey Lou's surgery, the lucky little girl gets to stay with Cindy and Ed and their 12-year-old Lab. Cindy says that Bailey Lou is a typical 2-year-old Golden, sweet and funny. She loves to gather toys, socks, etc. from around the house. She likes to snuggle and gets the zoomies in the morning. They try to keep her a little bit quiet so that she doesn't hurt herself. She is now on Rimadyl in addition to other pain meds and that seems to be helping her. She goes on two short walks per day and is working on leash behavior. It's hard when you are only 2 and everything is so interesting! Cindy and Ed are teaching her lots of good manners – like only having her Kong on her special quilt, her "place." She is completely house trained and uses the dog door well.

The surgeries will have to be done one at a time and the recovery process will be slow and painstaking. With her being so young, she should heal quickly, but it will be extra challenging to keep her quiet and less active for four to six weeks. One of her hips must be totally replaced and the other will be able to have a

procedure known as FHO (femoral head ostectomy). This procedure removes part of the bone at the end of the femur to restore
pain free movement of the hip joint. It is a little bit easier to recover from. We have our fingers crossed for this sweet little girl!

Having Bailey Lou go to her forever home before the surgery would be the best for her. That way she could settle into a quiet routine in advance. A home without stairs that need to be routinely climbed is necessary as she won't be able to do that for a few weeks at least. She gets along very well with other dogs but could also be an only dog.

Pupdate! Mary Lemma, who proofreads our newsletter, fell in love with Bailey when she was proofing the newsletter. That has never happened before...do we call that a "proofing failure"? Mary and her husband Joe, who accused her of "insider trading," adopted Bailey, and she joins a "sister," Teddie, a Great Pyrenees - Anatolian mix, and a "brother," Cooper, a German Shepherd. Both are also rescues. Bailey's wonderful foster parents included her blanket with the other items. Bailey joined her dad on the couch without being coaxed, and is busy running around the 4-acre property. Mary says: "She is AMAZING!"



Volunteer Spotlight?



Scarlett and Jeannie

When I retired from Coors in 2016, I was looking for an opportunity to give back. Living in Arvada just off Quaker, I had become aware that there was a Golden Retriever Rescue on 72nd Ave. not very far from our house. We had fallen in love with Goldens when we got our first sweetie pie back in 2000. We had since gotten another pup. I love dogs and the outdoors so I thought that helping out at GRRR might be just the ticket!

That was seven years ago now. I got swallowed up by the amazing organization that is GRRR. As a part of the VIP team, I fell in love every day with a new dog! And I wanted to learn all about how things work at GRRR. It wasn't long before I started helping Mary with transport. I did lots of trips within a three- to four- hour radius of Denver to pick up dogs or to take them up to CSU, or other vets, for treatments. Suffice it to say, I was hooked! Other odd jobs like writing for this newsletter and registering microchips came my way as I continued to learn.

In 2018, I was voted onto the Board of Directors. The Board meets about every month to review how the organization is doing and to plan for the future. It is a great group of people who all care so deeply about our mission and never forget that it is all about the dogs. I didn't stop being part of the VIP team because my favorite thing is getting to know each dog's backstory and their personalities, and then watching them get adopted. In the summer of 2019, I made a trip to Conifer to rescue a dog whose owners had severely neglected him. He was emaciated and covered in scabs and sores all over his

body. They had just kept him chained up outside in the mud. I couldn't even tell he was a Golden except that he was soooo sweet. He was calm and mellow despite having clearly suffered at the hands of people. My heart just melted. He did not have a name that we knew of. I named him Galen which, in Gaelic, means calm and peaceful. He was a wonderful boy.

Later that summer, we rescued four dogs from a breeder. These dogs were very traumatized by their early lives, living in cages with little human contact. Two of the dogs were very handsome brothers. They were both terrified and it was manifested by their barking and snarling at everyone who came into the kennel. One we named Camden, and we decided to name the other Galen. Maybe having that name would help him to be calm and peaceful. After about a week, I noticed that no one was taking Galen out of the kennel. When I approached his run, he would bark and snarl. He looked fierce. I decided to make him my little project. I started by just sitting on a stool outside his run and talking to him. Then I moved the stool inside the run. He would stay in the corner and not even look at me. As I scooted a little closer, I could see that he was trembling. After a few days, I scooted close enough to reach out and touch his chest. He kept shaking but he didn't bite me! I slowly worked up to getting a leash on him. He followed me out of the run and into the yard. I came to see Galen every day. He got better slowly and would come up to me in the play yard to get his pets. We visited Francie in the office every day, too, so he could get used to the noises in there and people coming and going. That little guy really touched my heart. I was so happy the day he went to his forever home.

After Galen, I became very dedicated to rescue of former breeding dogs, and it has been my passion ever since. It is one of the most rewarding but also heartbreaking and frustrating things we do at GRRR. Every dog that we rescue, rehabilitate, and rehome is special, but these guys so need our help. To better help them, GRRR has launched FAST (Fearful and Shy dog Team). See last quarter's newsletter for a description of FAST. The team has been up and running for about three months now. They work with our shy dogs like I did with Galen. I think it is making a difference!

I am so grateful to all the people of GRRR for the amazing things you do to help Goldens who need us!

Dusty came to GRRR at age 7 as a surrender. A week later he came into our lives, very aloof. It was clear he didn't understand who we were or why his family had abandoned him. He jumped up when we walked near him, as if afraid we'd step on him. He emitted a low growl if we tried to cuddle or love on him. He ran away from us at the dog park, chasing after families, clearly looking for the one he had lost. When on leash, he barked, growled and lunged at other dogs. But in time, his true Golden nature emerged.

He bonded with our 4-year-old Golden, Jameson, and they loved 'wrestling' with each other, taking turns 'winning' or 'surrendering'. They raced to be first to the door when we came home from work, Jameson with a toy in his mouth, which Dusty would promptly steal. They loved walking together, pulling and racing to be first to any new scent. With time and training, he was no longer leash aggressive and instead had to stop and greet every dog we encountered. Slowly he began to trust and accept us as his new people, finally



becoming the dog who never let us out of his sight, following us from room to room in our home. He became comfortable with strangers, leaning into everyone who would stop to pet him, especially kids.

Dusty was a klutz, a long-legged goof that we called our Oompa Loompa. He would only walk on the far left side of any trail or sidewalk, and insisted on being in the absolute middle of any bridge we crossed. He would fall all over himself to be first in or out the door, tripping in a rush on the way to the food bowl, stumbling while trying to get to his bed for a treat, and yet all the photos we took of him, he had a regal air about him, posed so handsomely. He could hear a plastic wrapper being opened, no matter how far away. He'd come running to find it, his head cocked sideways, his eyes inquisitive, with an ear raised high. He was a thoughtful and slow eater, yet there was never a dog who so joyfully and loudly crunched a dog biscuit with his mouth wide open. After a meal, he'd lie on the carpet and wipe his face with his paws, clearly happy with himself. He finally learned to let us lie with him and accept our love, relaxing into it. When he began to lick us, soft and gentle, his tongue like velvet, we knew he was content and had fully accepted us.

We learned he had slight hip dysplasia and also a neurological condition that the vet could not treat, but it didn't deter him. Cold weather was his favorite and despite snow and bone chilling temps, he'd pull on the leash like a team of horses. Even on his last day, he pulled us as he stumbled through a last neighborhood walk, sniffing out every scent to be found.

When you adopt an older dog, you know the heartache will come too quickly, whether you get three years, four or maybe five. We had the joy of seven years with Dusty, and though his big old heart didn't want to let go and he fought hard to stay, we had to look into those deep, liquid brown pools of his eyes and let him go on March 17. The heartache is still deep, but we wouldn't trade the seven amazing years we had with him. We know his body is finally whole again and that he's running fast, like the wind. Thanks GRRR- there are no words for our gratitude.

In Memory & S Yogi Bear by Virginia Corrigan

Yogi was rescued in 2011. He was brought to an emergency clinic by his first family, who needed to relinquish ownership to GRRR due to personal hardships. He underwent emergency surgery and an extended recovery in the ICU from a gastrointestinal foreign body, thanks to a generous donation from GRRR. During his time at the emergency clinic, I was fortunate enough to care for Yogi. I was in my internship, having just graduated from veterinary school the previous year. While caring for Yogi, I fell in love with his sweet personality.


After he met my three cats, sniffed each of their noses, and fell asleep on my couch, I knew
