GRRR brought out Fenway to meet Peaches. Shockingly, Peaches was the most well behaved she'd ever been, ever. However, that wasn't the biggest shock of our day. To say that Fenway was thin is not quite an accurate description. He'd been with GRRR for 30 days and we were told that he'd gained weight in their care. GRRR was feeding him three times a day. We were so stunned, but with Peaches surprise acceptance we took him home, hoping on a wing and a prayer that we be able to give him his best life.

Honestly, we didn't think Fenway would make it through the first night. He'd had a hard day - vets, grooming and now a new home. But to our amazement, he woke us up in the morning! We made an appointment to see our vet and began our mission to give him his best life. We also decided to change his name, giving him a new lease on life, so Mick Finley Owens was born. Finley to his friends and family.

All the things we worried about prior to this new adventure - how our new rescue would get along with Peaches, our 2 cats, our lifestyle, it never dawned on us that what we actually needed to worry about was how to get a 12-year-old dog to eat!

Finley wasn't terribly thrilled with the various concoctions we came up with. We kept him on the same kibble but tried to add a variety of things to entice him to eat more. He was the pickiest dog we'd ever had. He literally turned up his nose at some of our ideas...he didn't like canned pumpkin but canned yams were okay. Cottage cheese, eggs, beef broth, and yogurt were all no go's, as was adult canned dog food. Finally adding canned puppy food did the trick and we were able to get him to eat on a regular basis.

Then we went to the vets, and were told he needed to gain another 8-10 pounds. We knew that Finley had an enlarged heart, so our vets recommended a visit with a cardiologist. Sadly, the cardiologist found a hemangiosarcoma on his heart and gave him 12 days to live. Another shocker! Typically, the vet would have recommended chemotherapy immediately, but we all agreed he was too thin to withstand the side effects of the chemotherapy. We were assured he wasn't in pain, so off we went, armed with some joint meds, two kinds of mushrooms, and o<mark>ur new mission:</mark> to give Finley just one more day of his best life!

Finley has three beds, all the love he can get, good food, and mushroom medicine to keep him feeling his best. He has blossomed into the most beautiful, engaging, eccentric dog you can imagine. He barks at any animals on TV from llamas to raccoons to cats, and of course dogs! We would love to know why he barks at the animals on TV as it does make us laugh each time. He patrols the inside of our home two to three times a night to ensure we are safe. He has gained 10 pounds now and he gets two 1-mile meanderings through the park each day. We meander because we don't want to stress his heart. If we are lucky, he meets all his new friends, including Sally and Sammy, also GRRR alumni. They bring Ms. Linda with them, who has the best peanut butter treats!



Finley's most favorite thing to do is lie on his back and make angels in the grass, leaves and snow – snow angels are just the best! When he wants to go out or get our attention, he gives a little hop, skip and a head wave that is just too cute for words. We are two and half months into our 12-day diagnosis and we can't describe the joy each day brings.

We are grateful for GRRR for giving us this wonderful dog, and to the people who surrendered him. We are sorry you were in such a position as to have to give him away, but please know that he is well loved and very happy.

While we know there is sorrow in our future, in our present there is joy, delight, and gratitude. Each night we will continue to ask for just one more day with our Finley.

I cannot tell you the joy I felt the first time Athena (from that first mill dog group) honored me by taking her first HUGE step towards building trust with me. Someone witnessing it may not have even noticed because it was very subtle; however, I knew it was an enormous step for her! After weeks of just sitting in her kennel, she stopped her constant circular pacing and stood just out of my reach, then sort of leaned her head towards me, so I could gently pet her. There are no words to describe the gratitude, appreciation and excitement I felt at that moment! Humbling and powerful, to be sure. And I am so fortunate that I get to have this profound experience time and time again, thanks to GRRR's dedication in their mission of saving former breeder dogs.

I am so grateful to GRRR for allowing me to be a part of their fabulous organization. My life has been forever changed and enriched...especially working with the Fearful and Shy (FAS) dogs. I am profoundly grateful to, and in awe of, the FAS dogs. Their courage and capacity to forgive is unfathomable. Mary Kenton was astounded at the pitiful condition he was in. All he wanted was attention and to be close. He ate up every chin scratch and kind word Mary gave him. She decided that he deserved a better name than Batman so she named him Bruce Wayne! When Dee Delay and her son Justin came to groom him, they too were astounded and furious at how he had been treated. His skin was raw and infected, and his ears were just so sore. Flies had been biting his ears for a long time. He took in every bit of gentle kindness that they gave him. Poor guy probably had not ever been given this kind of attention before.

The next day, Dr. Carpenter saw him and prescribed antibiotics and twice weekly medicated baths due to his infected skin and ears. He had to wear the cone of shame so that he wouldn't scratch his ears. It turns out he also had mange, which required separate treatment. And he had a growth behind his ear which had to be surgically removed.

After a couple of months of medical treatment, good food, and lots of loving care, Bruce was doing just great and was very happy. He was ready to find his own home and his own people. # In Memory

# Greta

My Greta passed away in November of this past year. She came to me through GRRR when she was 5-1/2 years old, as a Missouri puppy mill mama rescue needing a quiet home environment. She came with a tremendous amount of trauma and PTSD around uncountable things.

Through the challenges we faced together, she ended up teaching me just as much, or perhaps more, than I taught her. After seeking help from multiple trainers who knew "fearful dogs," we found Sunny Weber, a true blessing, who wrote the book *Beyond Flight or Fight: A Compassionate Guide for Working with Fearful Dogs* and who gave me all the tools I needed to give Greta the opportunity to find her doggie self.

With the help of anxiety medication and consistent, patient persistence in giving her time to become familiar with and trust her environment and peeps, she made occasional leaps and bounds (sometimes repeating the lessons over as if she had never done them before). 

Waffles by Andrea Bendayan

I adopted Waffles on a cold evening in November prior to Thanksgiving. I received a call from GRRR talking about a new 5-year-old dog they just got from Turkey via Germany! At the time I was making waffles for breakfast (that's how he got his name). I was excited to get off work that day and drive to GRRR to meet him.

I met Waffles that night and decided to take him home. Waffles was shy and traumatized at first. He was extremely scared. However, with the passing of weeks and months, he learned that I was "a safe human" and our relationship started. The first few months were hard and stressful since he was diagnosed with severe late-stage arthritis of the spine, and there were times when Waffles couldn't walk at all and screamed in pain. I decided at that moment to dedicate myself to Waffles' recovery. My days revolved around giving him medications, supplements, physical therapy appointments, vet appointments, neurologist appointments, daily home exercises, daily stretching, and heat therapy. We also took walks on a rigid schedule, and he was fed daily homemade breakfast and dinner from scratch, with Ayurvedic principles to prolong his health and ease his pain.

I have to say that this lifestyle was my life for three years (this was like day and night 24/7 duty nonstop). Waffles had ups and downs during the three years but it was especially severe and stressful the first year. During our 3 wonderful years, Waffles loved going on daily walks (when he could), sleeping on my lap for hours while I studied, daily morning and before bed cuddles, and of course meal time. Waffles was with me day and night and taught me patience, grace, and to keep going despite the circumstances (the 3 things I was lacking in my life).



We lived mostly in Colorado but the last four months of his life we spent living it up in Germany. I transferred to



a German university and of course took Waffles with me. We traveled together in the cabin, and embarked on our expat adventure, just the two of us side by side. Our time together in Germany was the best, and Waffles was healthier and happier.

In December, Waffles developed some trouble breathing, so I made a vet appointment. The vet said Waffles had tracheal collapse and that he should be taken to the ER immediately. The vet office called a cab and we traveled 45 minutes to the nearest ER. When we finally arrived, the tracheal collapse was confirmed in the X-rays. In order to survive, Waffles needed surgery. However, if I proceeded with the surgery, Waffles would not be able to bark ever again, and there was a high risk that he would never walk again (due to his previous condition).

As a last gift of kindness, I decided to let him go. Waffles went for a nap in my arms like he did at home. When the medication was administered, Waffles briefly woke up, looked at me, and yawned. He died peacefully in my arms. His ashes will be distributed later this year in the alps. I and others will be forever grateful to Waffles for changing our lives and showing all of us that life is always worth it. �
