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Belle

When Golden Retriever Margie arrived at GRPR via animal control, no one knew she was pregnant. But on December 26, 2018, she gave birth to nine precious puppies. One of those pups, Belle, went on to change lives in incredible ways.

In February 2019, Eric Lundberg was invited to a meet-and-greet with the puppies. He brought along his current dogs: Murphy, his service dog, and Luna, a Great Pyrenees. The introduction went smoothly, and Eric took home a pup, naming her Belle.

Eric, a retired police officer and veteran, had endured a serious on-duty motorcycle accident that left him with limited mobility following a knee

replacement that his body rejected. Murphy was his lifeline, helping him with balance, navigating stairs, and even assisting him in getting back up if he fell. If Murphy couldn't help, she would seek assistance.

Shortly after adopting Belle, Murphy was diagnosed with pancreatitis and had to retire from service. Recognizing Belle's potential, Eric began training her himself, drawing on his experience from teaching puppies during his law enforcement career.



A New Chapter in Florida

After retiring, Eric moved to Florida and sought a professional organization to advance Belle's training as a service dog. He discovered Paws4Liberty, a nonprofit dedicated to training service dogs for veterans. At just over a year old, Belle began an intensive training program, or "boot camp," where she learned advanced skills and tasks.

Belle's trainer, Oscar, was immediately impressed by her intelligence, energy, and ability to focus. Following her training at Paws4Liberty, Belle and Eric spent an additional year refining their teamwork and perfecting her service skills. Belle earned her certifications, and undergoes reevaluations every two years to ensure she remains at the top of her game.

A Perfect Match

Not every dog is cut out to be a service dog, but Belle proved to be exceptional. Her natural intelligence, focus, and willingness to learn made her an ideal match for Eric. She also had help from Eric's other dogs—Murphy, who passed down her knowledge, and Luna, who provided maternal guidance and aided with obedience training.

Belle is trained in a variety of tasks, from retrieving dropped objects to fetching water bottles, mail, and more. She even wears a specialized harness that acts as a support cane, helping Eric navigate stairs and providing balance. While Eric doesn't have PTSD, Belle is trained as a PTSD service

dog, and can respond to distress signals by applying pressure with her paws to his thighs and refocusing his attention.

Belle's intuition is remarkable. Eric is diabetic, and Belle can detect his blood sugar drops before he does. While Eric uses a sensor to monitor his levels, Belle's alerts are often faster. She signals him with a blank stare, and if he dismisses her with an "I'm ok" signal but she senses otherwise, Belle applies pressure to his legs and gets in his face to ensure he takes action. Eric admits he sometimes ignores his body's warning signs, but Belle doesn't let up. She's incredibly in tune with his needs and persistent when it matters most.

Belle accompanies Eric to the VA, where her abilities continue to amaze. She has a remarkable sense for people's emotions and physical conditions, connecting effortlessly with autistic individuals and those in wheelchairs. Despite these connections, her primary focus remains on Eric, whom she watches over constantly to ensure his well-being. Belle thrives on being task-oriented, a natural trait of her field Golden Retriever lineage. If she's not engaged in a task, boredom quickly sets in!

One memorable incident highlighted Belle's dedication. A few years ago, Eric was doing some home remodeling and lost a tool in the garage. Frustrated and yelling, he struggled to retrieve it from behind a toolbox. Belle heard Eric but was inside the house and couldn't get to him, so she ran to get a contractor working in the house to check on Eric. Belle's instincts and dedication to her "job" are exceptional—she's always ready to step in and help, no matter the scenario.

A Life of Connection and Travel

Belle accompanies Eric everywhere, including frequent trips to Walt Disney World and on Disney Cruise Line and other cruise adventures. On their first Disney cruise, Eric was strict about not letting others pet Belle while she was working. He wanted to

evaluate her to see how she did. She did fine, so by their second cruise, he allowed it when people asked politely, realizing how much joy she brought to others. She has a special harness that says "Service Dog - Ask to Pet."

Belle meets a lot of people while traveling, and has a knack for calming others in distress, such as children having meltdowns or people experiencing anxiety attacks. She looks to Eric for permission before helping, then uses her training to soothe them.





During one trip, Belle formed a special bond with a woman using a walker, inspiring her to seek a service dog back home in Belgium. Her heartwarming clip of Belle meeting Disney's Princess Belle went viral on her Facebook page. ABC's Good Morning America saw it and even featured it on their "FurBabies" page!

Belle's impact goes beyond her work as a service dog. She has a dedicated Facebook page (search for Belle Lundberg, Personal Assistant) where fans follow her adventures, especially her Disney escapades. Eric really loves the heartwarming comments.


A Grateful Heart

Volunteer Spotlights

I have the very best volunteer job ever! I'm the puppy lady. I've been volunteering at GRRR for about 11 years. I started there as a way to honor the memory of a friend who had been on the GRRR Board, Joyce Morganfield. At first I did some office work and general dog socialization. Within a couple of years it morphed into my current role.

Whenever a litter of puppies is born at (or transferred to) GRRR, my work begins. Early on, when the puppies are still tiny and helpless, I go in every day and bond with the mama dog and let her get used to my smell and presence.



As the puppies grow, I start gently handling them and letting them get used to me. I weigh them weekly and keep the pen and whelping area clean and sanitized. By week four or five the real cleaning work begins on a daily basis. I pick up poop inside and out of the puppy room (lots and lots of poop), do laundry to keep the bedding clean, mop and sanitize floors, and lay out fresh papers. I help with deworming and make a point to handle and cuddle the puppies every day. I put my fingers in their ears and mouths, play with their feet, pull their tails gently, trim their nails, etc., to get them used to being handled.

Some puppies need lessons on using the dog door while others just naturally start running in and out. They are not actually house trained; they are simply able to use the door flap. By weeks six to seven they are all razor teeth and sharp nails as they leap up, grab clothing, untie shoes, chew on pant legs, play growl, and vocalize. They get into and pull down anything and everything they can reach. Cleaning now is a challenge as every movement is a big "chase and grab" game. Who needs toys when there are mops, brooms, and fresh newspapers? Their charm occasionally wears thin, until they lie down, exhausted, to sleep. A quick cuddle reminds me why I love this job. At eight weeks I'm happy to turn them over to their new forever homes (thanks to Roberta's neverending efforts). Another 4-6 days of deep cleaning and sanitizing the area and we're ready for the next litter!

P.S. Most days I also try to take Mary's and Francie's dogs, Molly, Logan, Jezebel, Ivy, and the new mama (I call them the house dogs) out for a short romp. I occasionally meet up with my husband, Ed Tanner, who is frequently there walking the kennel dogs and we all get a little exercise walking around the WOOF area. It's been a fulfilling and joyful experience for both of us. •

My association with GRRR began about eleven years ago. My wife and I had friends who were involved with GRRR and we liked the thought of helping. I started walking dogs a few times a week as part of the VIP team, or in some cases, they were walking me. There is not a single day when I do not get a laugh when I am with them. Who can't laugh at Tucker sliding through the snow trying to get the tennis ball, or Mookie carrying three balls back to the kennel wishing he could have been able to keep the fourth, or Molly making snow angels while scratching her back. I also enjoy socializing the dogs, just spending time petting them while they rest their head on my lap and drool on my jeans – who wouldn't enjoy that? It is also very rewarding to see the dogs change from being very shy and timid to becoming engaged and happy. Many of them adapt so quickly to their new world; it is great to see and be part of the change.

In addition to walking dogs on site, I have transported dogs being surrendered by owners, transported from shelters to GRRR, and met other transporters halfway and brought the dogs to GRRR. Also, I have taken some dogs to vet appointments in Ft. Collins,

Colorado Springs, and Denver. I enjoy being part of the team giving these Goldens (and Doodles, Pyrenees, Newfies, and Labs) a great chance to improve their health and to find a forever home. The ultimate reward for me is to arrive at the kennels for my day of walking, see that my favorite dog is no longer there, and learn that they have found a forever home.

While most of my focus is on the dogs, I have been involved with other projects around Phoebe's Place: simple things like pulling weeds, helping on cleanup days, securing tarps to provide shade for the puppies, trimming tree branches and loading them in the dumpster, or securing a fence that has been damaged by wind.

On a more personal level, we were very fortunate to adopt our Chocolate Labrador (Owen) almost eight years ago from GRRR. He was transported to GRRR with a Golden Retriever and spent several months at Phoebe's Place. He was always the first dog I walked; I needed all the energy I had, as he was a strong puller. Cindy and I decided to foster him after a request from GRRR when the kennels were full. Well, you know how that ended – we failed at fostering after three short days and gave him his forever home, and us a great deal of pleasure and challenge. Owen is growing older with us and providing much joy daily. Thank you for allowing me to share my joy and appreciation for all that GRRR and the volunteers do. \mathfrak{P}



FAST Report: Brooklyn

In the May 2024 issue, our cover article detailed GRRR's new FAST program to rehab shy and fearful dogs coming from puppy mills. Here is an amazing success story about Brooklyn.

Brooklyn was rescued from a mill dog operation and brought to GRRR on March 20, 2024. This beautiful cream Golden was very shy and huddled in the outside part of her kennel. Her soulful eyes and sweet nature tugged at our heartstrings immediately.

We learned early on that Brooklyn had her own idea of when and how long she would leave her kennel and explore her surroundings. Brooklyn was one of our most notorious "pancakers." She would walk on leash for a while, perhaps following her buddy Kayla (now Rosie), but then suddenly put on the brakes. Her prolific pancaking resulted in a developed technique and coined a phrase that we used to help her get from point A to point B, called the "Brooklyn Shuffle." This entailed straddling her, picking her up underneath her front legs, then helping her shuffle along on her back legs. (Note to self: Consider a little ibuprofen and/or back brace when planning on working with Brooklyn.)

Brooklyn called her own shots, and her pancaking was somewhat arbitrary. Once when she was feeling particularly plucky, she actually led me through the gate to Woof (GRRR's off-leash area). To my amazement, she trotted across the bridge and on down the steps. A breakthrough to be sure! Alas, then she decided to pancake at the bottom of the stairs. There was nothing much else to do but proceed (with much huffing and puffing on my part) with the "Brooklyn Shuffle" all the way back to her kennel. (Note to self: don't stray too far from the kennel unless another FASTer is available to help!)

As time went on, we learned that if we kept a 15-20 foot lead on her, and just have her follow us, she would actually leave and return to her kennel on her own. Patience was of paramount importance when working with Brooklyn. If we had an idea to pick up her leash and hurry her along, for some reason she would often respond with one of her infamous "nothing-doing-pancakes!" (Note to self: Give yourself plenty of time when taking Brooklyn out, as a "hurry-up" option with Brooklyn is sketchy at best.)

Brooklyn's life changed forever on July 18, 2024. Wendy and Barney, of Lyons, Colorado, adopted dear Brooklyn. She is now called Tilly. Wendy has kept a daily diary of their experience with Tilly. They had to go through the process of gaining her trust, which required so much patience and creativity! She was pancaking, and they had a hard time getting her into the backyard. She wasn't even following their other dog. Wendy and Barney tried all sorts of ways to connect with Tilly and get her to go into the backyard, including peanut butter trails, sleeping on the main level with her, and they even redid their extensive (and costly!) landscaping in order to better accommodate Tilly!

A breakthrough moment happened in their lives when they were notified that they needed to evacuate due to the fires. Barney was loading the truck and thinking to himself, "How are we going to get Tilly into the truck," when he saw Wendy leading Tilly around the house on leash! What a clear sign that Tilly knew she had a family who would keep her safe. (Last note to self: Witnessing a fearful and shy dog building trust with humans may be just about the greatest gift there is.)

Wendy and Barney still have challenges with sweet Tilly, though she has made such good progress. And one thing for certain... Tilly is HOME! ${\mathscr C}$


