Vlad

"Vlad's tail is constantly wagging. I'm amazed it doesn't hurt him when he's lying on a hard surface and pounding the floor with his tail when he gets excited – so, all the time! His entire body wiggles."

I first met Vlad in January 2017. He was the ninth Turkey Dog I had sponsored. I was lucky to be involved with the TD program from its inception and had interacted with almost all the TD dogs, so I was familiar with their plight. Poor Vlad was a real mess when he arrived from Istanbul. He was plagued with mites and had to be quarantined for six weeks. The little guy was super thin with hardly any fur left. His teeth were soft, and his breath was terrible due to some high-fever incident when he was a pup, possibly distemper. I spent time with him during this period and knew he was special.

I was in a place in my life where I was finally thinking of getting another dog after tragically losing my sweet Golden Sophie, eight years before. I started thinking maybe Vlad might be the one to make me commit to a new dog. At the same time, Vlad had someone scheduled to adopt him. I had gone out of town for a long weekend and when I returned, I found out the adoption had fallen through. I think GRRR's Director at the time, Kevin Shipley, knew I needed a dog in my life so I suspect he might have had a hand in my ending up with Vlad. It was meant to be!

Too friendly?

It took a few months, but Vlad's fur grew back quickly and eventually I was able to put 15 pounds on him to where he is now, a very fit 63 lbs. He needed three teeth extracted, but the anesthesia was rough on him. I can only imagine how difficult Vlad's prior life was in the three-plus years he spent fending for himself outside Istanbul. It was obvious that Vlad had been abused. What is amazing is how friendly Vlad is despite his background. He's not food motivated, which is crazy to me and made him even harder to train. In fact, he's not resource aggressive at all, which is surprising considering his feral background. If there are a bunch of dogs playing and a bully starts some trouble, Vlad will try to de-escalate the situation before it gets out of control. It's been difficult at times because Vlad gives so much affection to everyone but not much to me. He still cowers whenever I go to place a hand on his head, so I know he has had hands on him before, but not in a good way. Vlad is also one of the more energetic Golden retrievers I've ever seen. He will outlast multiple dogs during an outing. He absolutely loves life even more than most Golden pups, which is hard to believe. I always warn people that he's too friendly!

Tug of War—With a Ball?

Vlad is terrible on leash but even worse when he's off. He will run hundreds of yards away to engage anyone and everyone in a potential game of tug. His favorite game is to go up to every single person on our walks and present them with a tennis ball as if he wants them to throw it. Instead, he tries to get them to play tug of war. If he gets even the slightest acknowledgment, he will continue to push his wet muzzle into their hand. I find myself apologizing and laughing at the same time because somehow, he always gets away with it. He completely ignores





me in public. As soon as I let him off leash, he will go seek out his first of many “victims” and start his tug of war games. The goofball always gets away with it so I’ve learned to live with being that dog owner, the one who can’t control his maniacal beast. At least his sweet, infectious energy wins over every time.

From Non-swimmer to... Duck Chaser?

We go to Coot Lake often, and Vlad didn’t swim the first few months I had him. I assumed he never had the opportunity in Istanbul, but after a few months, I was starting to think I might have a Golden that just doesn’t swim. Then one day he got up to his elbows with some other Golden retrievers and that was it! A couple of weeks later he was out in the middle of a lake, completely ignoring my calls and harassing ducks and ducklings, so I had to go swimming after him. I chased him down and finally grabbed him before he drowned the both of us! Mama duck was way smarter than him anyway, so there was no chance of him ever catching them, but he probably would have kept chasing them until he drowned.



He’s a fantastic swimmer now. He will go fetch his ball as far as I can chuck it. He will also tread water for a half an hour trying to fit two balls in his mouth for the thousandth time. He thinks every day is going to be the day he can fit two. So, not so smart in this case! Vlad’s latest obsession since he turned 10 is fishing. When he starts that, I have absolutely no control of him as the tennis ball has now lost all its power.

His energy is infectious. Vlad is THE happiest dog on the planet! I know that’s a bold statement, but I challenge anyone to prove otherwise! Vlad loves everyone including the vet, the groomer and GRRR. Vlad absolutely loves Mary Kenton and Francie Rakie! He loves doggie camp so much that when I come back from a trip, he makes it clear he would rather stay there than go home with me. At least it helps with my guilt over having to leave him.

Bringing Joy

I’ve taken Vlad to a nursing home in Gunnison a few times and it’s wonderful to see some of the residents become animated when they get some Vlad time. It’s touching to see people light up, remembering and talking about their beloved dogs from their past. I wish I could use Vlad to bring some joy to more people in need, but his energy level is just too unmanageable. I can only imagine the good work he could do in a children’s cancer ward. He brings joy to people every day he’s out in the world, so we do have that at least.

More than a few times I have come across people seeming to have a bad day and I’ve asked them to say hi to Vlad, and they all thank him for making their day better. There is no better feeling in the world than that and Vlad does it all the time. His passion and pure joy for life is undeniable.

Here we are almost nine years later, and Vlad has been with me the entire time. He’s my boy and constant companion. Vlad is a complicated pup, and it hasn’t been easy, but I wouldn’t change a thing. I can’t believe he is over 12 years old now because he’s hardly slowed down at all. These days he’s a little more obedient but he still makes me look like the most irresponsible dog owner in public. He’s a little more affectionate to me now, especially in the mornings when he demands belly rubs to start his day. I’m so lucky to have ended up with such a unique and vibrant dog. He has made me a better human in our journey together. Looking back, I can honestly say I don’t know what I would have done without him. As the saying goes, “who saved who?”

I cherish every day we have together and consider every tomorrow with Vlad a gift. 💙



The Sweetest Soul: Charlie's Golden Comeback

At 12 years old, Charlie has lived a life overflowing with love, loyalty, and Golden Retriever joy. Anyone who meets him is struck by his gentle nature—he truly has one of the sweetest souls you could ever imagine.

But thanks to the skilled hands of his surgeon, the operation was a success! The tumor was removed, and Charlie's tail was saved!

Charlie's resilience has been nothing short of inspiring. Just one day after surgery, he surprised everyone by getting up and joining his sister, Ellie, for their cherished morning walk. He was not going to take no for an answer! It was only a short stroll to the end of the yard and back, but it was a powerful sign of his determination and spirit. With each passing day, Charlie grew stronger, adding a little more distance and showing his family that his golden heart was as strong as ever.

Through it all, Charlie's devoted sister, Ellie, has been by his side. She has stepped into the role of caregiver with ease, offering companionship, comfort, and her own brand of golden encouragement. Whether she's keeping him company or simply lying nearby to remind him he's not alone, Ellie has been a true partner in his healing.




Dear GRRR:



Golden Angel: Cora

Cora's Journey to GRRR

At just 8 weeks old, Cora entered our care under heartbreaking circumstances. She was surrendered by a breeder who suspected she had a serious medical condition—an **ectopic ureter**, a congenital defect where the tube that carries urine from the kidney doesn't connect properly to the bladder. This causes constant leaking, discomfort, and painful skin burns.

When Cora arrived, she was in rough shape. Her tiny belly was covered in raw, red urine burns that required frequent medicated baths and gentle handling. Despite the pain, she greeted her caregivers with soft eyes and a trusting heart. It was clear from the start—this little girl was a fighter.

But Cora's story isn't just one of struggle. It's one of **resilience, joy, and the power of community**.

Thanks to the support of GRRR's Golden Angel Fund, Cora began receiving the care she desperately needed. Our team immediately started exploring surgical options to correct her condition, knowing that with the right treatment, she could live a full, happy life.

And what a life she's already begun to live.

Just a few months later, Cora is thriving. Every morning, she starts her day with a heart-melting ritual: she trots over, leash in mouth, ready for her walk. It's her way of saying, "I'm ready for adventure!" And adventure, for Cora, means bounding through the grass with her best friend Journey, gently playing with the tiniest Pomeranians, and winning over every soul she meets.

She's growing fast—like a weed, as they say—and with every inch she gains, so does her spirit. Cora is mastering potty training, learning to signal when she needs to go out, and attending manners school with Tommy, the beloved trainer at J-M Dog Spa. Tommy calls her an "A+ student," and it's easy to see why. She learns quickly, listens intently, and radiates joy.

Her charm has spilled beyond the shop walls. The bar next door has unofficially crowned her their mascot. Patrons stop by with snapshots of Cora training in the grass, marveling at her progress and her ever-growing fan club. She's become a spokesdog for GRRR—grabbing attention not just for her cuteness, but for her courage.

But behind that playful sparkle is a challenge Cora faces daily. Her condition means she still leaks urine constantly, and to keep her clean and comfortable, the entire shop has rallied around her. Staff members take turns giving her daily baths, soothing her skin and wrapping her in love. It's not her favorite part of the day, but she endures it with grace, knowing she's surrounded by people who care deeply.

The good news? Cora is a candidate for **corrective surgery** when she turns six months old this November. This procedure could change everything—giving her the comfort, dignity, and freedom she deserves. It's a chance to leave behind the pain and embrace a future full of play, companionship, and joy.

But we can't do it alone.

We're raising funds to cover the cost of Cora's surgery and her ongoing care. Every dollar donated to the Golden Angel Fund helps us provide life-changing treatment—not just for Cora, but for other dogs like her who come to us in need.

Cora has already given so much to everyone she meets. She's a reminder of how love, resilience, and community can transform a life. Now, it's our turn to give back.

I wanted to tell you about a recent Denver Post article about a serious backcountry issue. Although it was written for summer hiking, it definitely applies to winter ski and snowshoe sports. And it's not just for serious athletes or 14ers, it's for all of us ordinary outdoors lovers.

Basically, the article tells us that backcountry pet rescues are rising. The number of pets on the trails is increasing, and the all-volunteer rescue teams are risking their own safety to help our pets who are unprepared for the terrain and climate. This can be from paw injuries, conditioning/exhaustion, altitude sickness, or wildlife encounters. Those of us with large Golden Retrievers know we can't carry them out from most high-country trails.

Rescue team members will tell you to check with your veterinarian if you're not certain about your pet's ability to undertake the adventure you're considering. After all, the rescue team's primary role is to rescue people. They love our pets, but may or may not be able to help when needed.

Thanks for considering this important issue when planning an outdoor adventure. 💙



Fall Fixes and Fresh Starts at Phoebe's Place

If you've noticed a flurry of activity around Phoebe's Place lately, you're not imagining things — we've been busy making the most of the beautiful fall weather to tackle some long-overdue maintenance projects!

Thanks to a generous donation from a kind-hearted couple, the track around WOOF (the fenced dog play area on the other side of the bridge) got a major upgrade. The goat-head-covered path is officially gone, replaced by a smooth crushed cement track that's a big improvement for both our dogs and their human companions.

We also added a concrete pad with a pergola to provide some much-needed shade, and plans are already in motion to install a second pergola in BOB (the big turfed area next to the house that Robert Sturm donated). Behind the kennels and vet room, we swapped out the pea gravel for clean, sturdy concrete slabs, complete with a drainage system to help minimize odors and keep things fresh for our pups.

Next up: in November, we'll be applying a coat of epoxy to those new slabs to make cleaning and sanitizing the outdoor runs even easier. And to top it all off, the kennel and office received fresh coats of paint and some much-needed soffit repairs.

It's been a whirlwind of improvements, and we're thrilled to share that we've finally received approval to rezone the property. That means our long-awaited addition is (hopefully!) just around the corner.

Fingers, tails, and paws crossed for what's to come! 💙
